



Are you jeopardizing your right to make a self-pay for your Health & Welfare insurance?

Are you jeopardizing your unemployment benefits?

You could be if you don't know the out-of-work list rules.

Do you know the rules? Even if you think you do, please read them again!

- 1) You must have your name on the out-of-work list if you are laid off.....EVEN IF you believe you will be returning to work for your previous employer.
- 2) You must check in at least once every 30-days to remain on the list. Your name will be dropped on the 31st day.
- 3) In order to put your name on the out-of-work list you can:
 - Call the Des Moines office 515-265-1657
 - Email the Des Moines office office@Local234.com
 - Check-in at the Des Moines office in person
 - Call your Business Rep
 - Log-on to the website (Local234.com) and check-in through the 'Members Only' section
 - Mark 'yes' for the out-of-work list on the sign-in sheet at a Union meeting
- 4) You must be on the out-of-work list in order to make a self-pay for Health & Welfare.
- 5) You must be on the out-of-work list and be a Member in good standing for unemployment benefits. If the unemployment office does an audit on you, and you are not on the list or not in good standing, the office will not lie. This may lead to you having to pay back your unemployment benefits.

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT

We finished 2023 strong, mostly due to the mild start to winter. A lot of contractors were able to finish up projects. Some contractors have started projects that were scheduled to begin in spring. Let's hope the nice weather we have seen the last month continues so that everyone can get back to work early this spring.

We saw some changes to the rules for unemployment compensation last year during the legislative session that hurt a lot of our Members. The maximum number of weeks a person can draw unemployment was cut from 26 weeks down to 16. That may work in the southern states, but in the Midwest, where winter can bring more than 16 weeks of freezing temperatures, it just does not work. When the law first passed, the Union and non-union contractors were actually working together to figure out how to get the construction industry exempt from the new laws, but with the Governor announcing that the rate the employers pay for unemployment will be going down, all of a sudden the contractors want to wait and see how that affects them. If that doesn't put it into perspective, I don't know what will. This year at the capitol, we are seeing another attack on the public employees that could make the Unions take the public employers to court if the employers don't turn employee lists into PERB for election purposes. Currently, those groups that don't turn in employee lists support Unions, and want their employees to be in a Union. I believe this possible new law will undoubtedly threaten Union and employer relationships.

Like you've heard me say in every newsletter, Health and Welfare expenses are continuing to go up, but our Fund continues to remain healthy. The prescription drug costs continue to be a huge expense and seem to be out of control. The Health and Welfare Board is still looking for a health program to replace the yearly physicals that we lost when Health Dynamics went out of business. Like I said above, our Fund remains healthy, and a lot of that has to do with the use of generic prescription drugs as well as the Doctor-on-Demand program. Quite a few trades have had to take up to a dollar or more of their wages over the last year to keep their health plans financially healthy, and I don't ever want to be forced to tell the Local 234 Membership that we have to do that. The continued decisions by the Membership to put 10 or 15 cents towards our health plan every year should prevent that moving forward.

The Apprenticeship and Training Site continues to improve with new equipment and new classes offered for the Membership to train on and stay updated on certifications. Some of the remote training classes that the instructors have been doing are offered multiple times throughout the training season. I'm not saying that they won't continue to travel, but sometimes the timing of the travel presents problems. Our International Training Site in Crosby, Texas continues to offer classes that we do not, so if you don't see something on our schedule, please check the International Training Site. The International will pay for transportation, lodging, and meals for any classes offered.

The Local, along with the Apprenticeship and Training Site, have been working on updating our Membership management software for the last six months. Part of the software makes the out-of-work list live, which is a great benefit to the agents while dispatching Members to work. With that being said, it's very important to fill out a new qualifications register, and keep your certifications updated. This helps to ensure your name comes up when the agents are searching the system.

I hope to see a large attendance at the General Membership meeting at the Des Moines Hall on March 30th at 11:00 a.m., and please remember to stay updated on the out-of-work list if you are not working.

The 2024 season is looking to be another busy one for the Members of Local 234. We have several ongoing projects that kept Members working through winter, and there are many more projects set to kick off this spring. Another good sign for the upcoming work season is that we have had several contractors reaching out to us for upcoming manpower needs.

I am hoping by the time you read this newsletter, we will have begun to negotiate our Districts 1 and 3 Building Agreements that will be ending their 3-year terms on April 30th. We have also been negotiating wages for our Energy Agreement under a wage opener. As we reach tentative agreements for each of these CBAs, Members will be voting whether to ratify, and also how to breakdown the increases to



wages/Health & Welfare/pension/etc. after ratification. If you wish to have a say in whether the open Building Agreements are ratified and/or where raises are allocated to, please make sure your dues are current and attend the pertinent District Membership meeting. The Energy Agreement will be voted at all District meetings.

We have also been negotiating several of our open Stationary Agreements around the state and are bringing them back to the Members of these groups for ratification.

Organizing is a cornerstone of the Labor movement, and we are constantly out talking to non-Members and non-union contractors in our Industry about the advantages of working Union. It is every Member's duty to promote Local 234, and it is our skilled Members that attract new contractors to sign an agreement with OUR Local. If you know of any people interested in a career in our Industry, please get them in touch with a Local agent to have them lined up with an evaluation at the Training Site.

> If you travel out of Local 234's jurisdiction for work, you must clear in with the Local which has jurisdiction over where you will be working. Members not clearing in and getting caught working in other jurisdictions has been an ongoing issue. By clearing in, you stay in the good graces of our sister Locals. It also ensures your benefits can be transferred back to Local 234, which in turn keeps you eligible for insurance, and keeps your pension growing.

> With the spring construction season seemingly getting an early start, make sure to stay updated on the out-of-work list so the agents know you are available for work. Also, it's important for your future to make sure to utilize the Training Site to keep your skills sharp and certifications up to date.

Chad Carter Vice President & Business Representative It's hard to believe it is time for the typical work season to start kicking off soon, although there are possibilities for this work season to get an early start. This winter has been crazy with the above normal temperatures and us not having snow on the ground a majority of the time.

Of the Stationary units that I handle, we had only one with a wage opener this winter.

We also settled a one-year Agreement with the Des Moines Airport Authority Board.

I don't like to talk about politics, but there is another bill that might be coming out of the Iowa Senate that would have a direct effect on Unions. The bill is SB3I58. This bill will require Unions to go to court if a public employer fails to send the employee list in to the State Labor Board — or the group will be decertified. This will cost the Union more money and resources. Please call your State Senator to let them know to stop the attacks on working families.

The Distribution work in Iowa has been slow this winter, which translates into less Members working this type of work than in past winters. I feel that this will change with all of the public projects that are out for bid right now. We also lost the Mid-American restoration and traffic blanket contract this



goaround. Q3 has had this contract for the last several years, but a IBEW Local 55 contractor got the con-



tract. Q3 will move their Operators over to the services side, but it sucks that another craft is claiming this work.

The Pipeline work for this year is looking to be another year of maintenance work. Our contractors don't always get awarded this work unless the nonunion contractor gets full, or they mess the job up, then our Union Contractors come in and fix it.

Overall, Building work looks to be very good again for 2024. There is work going on at the Des Moines Airport and we have Operators working at Mercy hospital parking ramp. We also are seeing a good number of commercial warehouses going up, along with a number of school additions.

We have a few Energy, Heavy, Chemical and Heavy Industrial projects going currently, and some more starting throughout March of this year. We have a few Operators working at Cargill in Eddyville. ADM is going to be starting an addition in Des Moines in March. We will see three powerhouse shutdowns starting in late March or early April. We have Mountain Crane doing the demo of four wind turbines also.

Dirt work is already starting to ramp up for the season. There are a few new sewer plant projects that are coming out for bid, or are out for bid now. We are also seeing a good amount of Interstate work out for bid.

There are actually over 150 public projects out for bid in just Polk and surrounding counties. These include State, City, School, DOT and any other that are not let by a private entity. With the all-round workload coming up, I think we have reason to be thankful.

Work in District 2 for 2024 should be busy from all indications early in the work season. Local contractors have the majority of Operators back to work already, and most plan to add more to their workforce. Work at the Duane Arnold Solar Farm in Palo continues with Elder, Allied Fence and Cupertino Electric. The project should be complete by November

2024. There is a possibility that more phases of work will roll out, but at this time, no permits have been issued.

Work at the Lansing Mississippi River Bridge continues with Kraemer North America and Tschiggfrie Excavating working on site. Miron is working on five projects in the Iowa City/Cedar Rapids area. There is talk of an eight-building data center coming to Cedar Rapids. The developer is currently in discussions with the City of Cedar Rapids and the State of Iowa for financial incentives. Mountain Crane will be doing a windmill repower project in Franklin County.

Local 234 has settled the Chickasaw County Roads Agreement. Negotiations are continuing with the City

of Dubuque.

As a reminder, most jobsites are requiring First

Aid/CPR and OSHA 10. Any sites with cranes are also requiring Signal and Rigging certifications. If you are in need of any of these certifications, please contact the Training Site to inquire about class schedules. Having these oftentimes-mandated certifications will ensure you won't miss out on job opportunities. Also, remember that any time you are laid-off you will need to put your name on the out-of-work list, and check in at least once every 30 days to keep your name on the list. Not putting your name on, or keeping your name updated, on the out-of-work list can cause issues with unemployment and will cause issues with Health & Welfare if you ever need to make a self-pay.

At the February Local 234 Executive Board meeting, the Board discussed the lack of attendance at the Waterloo quarterly meeting. Unfortunately, the last meeting that had enough Members in attendance to have a quorum was in March of 2019. Due to this, effective immediately, the Waterloo quarterly meetings are canceled. However, the Board made their decision very clear that the meetings will be reinstated if there is enough interest from the Membership in the future.

The Building contractors remain busy in District 3, with W.A. Klinger and DM Steel continuing their work on the Royal Canin Expansion. Klinger is also working on an addition to the Marriott Convention Center, along with several other smaller projects. DM Steel is currently working on a school addition, an expansion to the Gerkin Windows facility, as

well as a hospital addition in Spencer.

Barnhart Crane, along with all the other crane rental

contractors, remain busy with wind turbine maintenance, curbside service, and



shutdowns. Patriot Crane will be on site for the shutdown at the power house near Sioux City, along with Hayes Mechanical and Brandsafway. National Minerals Corp has been hiring and their work continues at both the Council Bluffs and Sioux City power houses.

We are currently in Stationary negotiations with multiple Public Sector groups, as well as negotiations with the rural electric cooperatives in the area. Most of the negotiations have gone well so far. It also looks like we'll have another busy season on the Hoisting & Portable side.



Work continues on the SLN 4 Building Project Labor Agreement (PLA) in Council Bluffs. There were several

Operators that worked steady throughout the winter months for J.E. Dunn, Barnhart, Patriot, Topping Out d/b/a Davis Erection, Berkel and Global Earthworks. SLN 5 did not have a PLA in place, so only companies signed to a Local 234 Agreement are performing work on Building 5. Local 234, after 2 ½ months of "Shame on J.E. Dunn" bannering, attained a PLA for Building 6 and J.E. Dunn has agreed to talk with the Local about upcoming projects in our jurisdiction, which is a step in the right direction for our Members.

Members have also worked on the IPL Creston Solar Project throughout the winter. On this project, which is a 50-mw solar farm, the underground work should be completed around the beginning of April, and the full project will be completed mid-summer. Rachel will be performing the finish grading.

On the Stationary side of things, we have been working on negotiating open contracts and wage openers. We are still working to get lowa Wester Community College's Agreement settled and have meetings scheduled. The Members employed at SGS have ratified their Agreement and we have a tentative Agreement for the City of Chariton, pending the City Council's approval.


It is vital that all Members fill out a qualification register and keep it updated

OFFICE & FINANCE

Our International Union has seen a slight uptick in the number of Members, and Local 234's Membership numbers have leveled off after losing some due to the Chapter 20 raid by lowa Legislators seven or so years ago. With that info – I'd like to provide some other good news: 71% of Americans support Unions (highest level in close to

60 years), 88% of Americans under age 30 support Unions (our future is looking bright), 18% - that's how much more Union workers make in wages than their non-Union counterparts, 90% + Union workers have access to employer-provided health care, while only 68% of the non-Union workers have the same access according to the DOL.

The transition into the new Membership Management system the Local started in October of last year has turned out to be a good thing, on several levels. It is allowing more precise information for dispatching, and it will lead to a more powerful way of storing all information pertaining to Members on an individual basis. Although it was our hopes to be able to have the Membership Portal up and running by now, I truly believe it will be worth waiting for. Be on the look-out for information about it at Union Meetings, in the next Newsletter, and on the website.

Because of the change over to this new system, all Portable & Hoisting Members are being asked to complete a Qualifications Register — even if you have done so in the past. It is vital that everyone keep these up-to-date! If you don't want to complete the one that is in this newsletter, please go online to <u>www.local234.com</u> and complete it electronically. If it wasn't important, you wouldn't be asked to take the time to do it.

There have not been any changes to the Central Pension Fund. The Fund, as of the last Annual Funding Notice, was 107.3% funded, and is the 2nd largest multi-employer defined benefit pension fund in the United States. The CPF will soon be mailing out semi-yearly Participant's Statements, and shortly after that all participants will be sent the latest Annual Funding Notice. I'm sure everyone is hoping for continued growth.

HEALTH & WELFARE FUND

Members are encouraged to call Health & Welfare anytime to verify reported hours for insurance eligibility to avoid a lapse in coverage.

If you are thinking about retirement, you may be entitled to continue your health coverage after retirement. Contact Health & Welfare for an estimated cost of your monthly insurance self-payment.

Well.... I hate to jinx things by saying it, but the weather this training season has been better than expected. It has really helped with the field training for Apprentices and Journeypersons alike. Hopefully, the weather continues to cooperate not only to help field training here onsite, but so that Members can get back to work early this spring.

This winter we have seen an increase in Members attending the OSHA 10, OSHA 30 and First Aid/CPR courses. I believe it's primarily because more contractors and the owners they are working for are requiring those certifications. I would like to stress the importance of keeping your certifications up-to-date. Now is the time to look over your certification and make sure you are ready for work.

The Apprenticeship Program continues to have good numbers. From all indications, it looks like there will be a strong workload for the coming season to keep them busy. In April, there will be several large high school career fairs around lowa and the Program will be actively participating in order to recruit new Apprentices. With college student loan debt becoming a larger issue, we are starting to see more interest in what the Skilled Trades Apprenticeship Programs have to offer.

Over the past year, CCO has been implementing a

lot of changes, one of which has required written tests to be done on computers. Members for the most part seem to have adapted well to these requirements. The Training Program will offer a study day followed by a CCO written test the next day in October 2024. There is also the option for Members to test individually directly through CCO, if needed.
